You will be invoiced for your 2025 Assessment in early January. **IF YOU DO NOT RECEIVE YOUR INVOICE BY THE END OF THE FIRST WEEK OF JANUARY, THEN CALL THE POA OFFICE at 843.681.8800**.

WHAT TO DO NEXT:

Please read your invoice carefully and remit your payment by January 31st, 2025 to avoid late fees. Cash payments must be made in person at the POA Service Center located at 7 Surrey Lane. Checks can be mailed or dropped off in person. Please be sure to write your account number (which is on the top right corner of the invoice) on the check and include the remittance copy with your payment. Credit Card information can be filled in on the invoice and mailed.

IMPORTANT THINGS YOU MAY NOT KNOW:

In the past, some property owners have not taken advantage of the cash/check payment discount. While the Board has set the assessment amount to account for the transaction fee imposed by the credit card companies, there is a discount if you pay by cash or check. Please remit the appropriate assessment amount. We will not be able to refund overpayments.

Additionally, I want to emphasize a foundational philosophy of the HHPPOA Board and Staff: Fiscal Discipline. As many of you know, the Annual Assessment for living in our community of nearly 10,000 residents is less than \$1,300 per year. This financial discipline allows the HHPPOA to maintain a low assessment rate while keeping the POA debt-free. This prudent approach ensures we remain in a strong financial position, avoiding the unfortunate outcomes seen in POA organizations elsewhere in the nation. The Board and Staff work hard to balance desired improvements with financial responsibility, particularly in these uncertain geopolitical times.

My suggestion, as always, is to get involved—volunteer, participate, and build meaningful relationships while bringing your unique experiences to the POA for the benefit of all: residents, business partners, and staff!

A letter from our General Manager

2024 in Review

This past year brought so many positives that I may inevitably leave out some notable occurrences—not because they don't deserve mention, but simply due to space limitations. We entered 2024 with the new Dolphin Head Rec Area fully operational and available for private rentals. Many clubs and property owners flocked to use this new facility. The Activities Department also made great use of the new venue, hosting several concerts on the new event lawn.

The financial news was equally positive. By the end of 2023, the Capital Transfer Fund had generated enough revenue to cover the more than \$4-million-dollar project, with approximately \$200,000 remaining to carry over into 2024. We also tackled two major paving projects—Dolphin Head Drive and Skull Creek Drive—and our leisure paths are currently undergoing repairs and renovations.

During the summer, our Kids Kamp program once again sold out, and we saw increased participation in Tennis, Pickleball, and Bocce. Despite rising interest rates and higher home values, real estate continued to move briskly in Hilton Head Plantation. Many new residents immediately began renovating their homes, which led to an increase in demand for all kinds of tradespeople—boosting gate fee revenue. Exterior additions and remodeling were also top of mind, prompting more applications to the ARB. Additionally, the RV/Boat Storage area saw a surge in revenue, and our new Communications Coordinator achieved record advertising sales. All of these factors contributed to a robust revenue stream for 2024. We are on track to end the year with a significant positive variance to budget, though it is still too early to predict an exact number.

We were also pleased to learn that the Town of Hilton Head Island is finalizing plans for a multi-million-dollar beach renovation for Pine Island, which is expected to begin in mid to late 2025. On our end, we moved forward with the installation of a state-of-the-art camera system to monitor the security gates and began working on new registration software. This will eventually allow property owners to register for and pay for classes on-line—setting the stage for future online payments for property assessments.

In an effort to keep up with increased editorial content, we expanded Plantation Living to accommodate more articles. We also selected a new set of note cards to benefit the Conservancy Foundation. For the first time, we live-streamed "Coffee with Peter" via Zoom. Based on the 2024 survey results and input from community committee members, the Strategic Plan is currently being updated. In response to survey feedback, the Recreation Committee recommended that the Board engage a land planner, architect, and engineer to assess whether the Plantation House, which is the next capital project on the horizon, should be demolished or renovated.

We also undertook several aesthetic upgrades. The Gate Houses

and the POA Service Center received a fresh coat of paint, while the Splash Pad at Spring Lake Pool was resurfaced, and pool furniture was refurbished. Based on your feedback about the new Dolphin Head Recreation Area, we added acoustic panels to the interior of the building, additional parking lot lighting, and updated signage for better direction and safety.

When we have a stretch of time without criminal activity, we have an unwritten protocol among the Security Officers and me. We don't talk about it for fear of jinxing the systems we have in place to help minimize the prospects of criminal activity. However, aside from a handful of minor incidents, we have been fortunate to have a vigilant and capable security team keeping us safe throughout the year. A word on leadership, which starts at the top of our Security Department. Major Warren Gaither is one of the many reasons our Security Department operates so well. Major Gaither has been an exceptional leader and mentor, from his personnel skills with his officers to identifying potential hot spots to focusing on technology. As you may know, Warren served in the Marine Corps as his first career, honorably leaving as an MP with the rank of Sergeant. During Warren's military career, he was stationed worldwide, helping keep us safe. Sometime in 2025, Warren may decide to retire. One of my many jobs will be to try to keep Warren on as long as possible so he can train his eventual replacement. We will have more on Major Gaither as we get into 2025.

Representing HHP

During the holiday season, Hilton Head Plantation takes on a special charm with its decorations, lights, and festive atmosphere. This time of year presents a unique opportunity to showcase the place we call home. The most valuable endorsement of HHP comes from you, our residents. It's our collective responsibility to advocate for our community. Here are a few key points for polishing up your "elevator speech" when talking about HHP:

- HHP is a residential community with an abundance of natural beauty.
- We boast four golf courses, 12 Har-Tru tennis courts, and a new state-of-the-art clubhouse at the Spring Lake Pavilion.
- We have 10 miles of leisure paths, excellent wireless service, and an airport just 10 minutes from our main gate.
- Our amenities include a full-service country club, the Lager-Head Tavern, a multi-generational pool complex, outstanding security, a marina, miles of beaches, the Bluff Walk, the Pine Island Boardwalk, Whooping Crane and Cypress Conservancies, and the all-new Dolphin Head Recreation Area.
- Our diverse range of house styles and price points caters to all, and we are entirely debt-free thanks to sound fiscal management.
- We offer activities for all ages, are family- and kid-friendly, and have one of the lowest annual assessments in the area.

These are just a few points to help you represent HHP with pride.

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plain sight. When biking, jogging, or walking, wear bright clothing to ensure you're visible, especially at night. If you own a weapon, please store it securely and never leave it in an unlocked vehicle.

"Do you have a story to tell?" Karin gently asked her 103rd foster baby this summer, cradling the newborn and soothing him back to sleep. The 93-year-old and the baby shared a moment, a lifetime of care and wisdom meeting a new life eager to receive.

Karin Van Name's story began on Staten Island in 1931, with a life of caregiving ahead. Perhaps her devotion began with her love of dolls, babysitting, or visiting the kittens that lived under her father Hugh's desk at his neighborhood grocery and deli. Or maybe it came from her mother, Matilda, who worked as an aide at Willowbrook State School, caring for individuals with severe mental illness.



After finishing Catholic school, Karin

trained as a surgical operating room nurse in El Salvador, staying with her aunt and uncle and working at their friend's hospital. A summer plan turned into two years of caring for patients and her first foray into love, infamously, with a man named Raul. But at her father's insistence, she returned to the U.S. to attend Wagner College on Staten Island, where she met her future husband. Married in 1952, she worked at a veterinary virus research lab at Cornell while her husband completed veterinary school. When she was laid off while nine months pregnant, Karin returned to her roots. She cared for her first child, Dawn, born in 1953, while pregnant with her second, April, who arrived on the same date in 1954. And in 1959, little sister, Kim, was welcomed into their cozy home. To help pay the rent, she also cared for seven other children in Ithaca whose parents owned the store below their apartment.

The years brought moves to Buffalo, Massapequa Park, and eventually Nassau Shores, where Karin raised her three daughters—Dawn, April, and Kim. She also worked as an ophthalmic therapist, babysat other children, and kept a beautifully decorated home, always with a kitten or two. After divorcing in 1967, she supported her family by working for the Massapequa Post and the Amityville Record, advancing from advertising sales to Advertising Director. And yet, while boasting her share of impressive career titles, Karin always said her best job ever was as a foster mother.

Karin's daughters followed her nurturing example, all pursuing careers in the medical field. Dawn became a Medical Technologist and raised her family in Pennsylvania, giving Karin two granddaughters, Hana and Cara. Kim and April became Radiologic Technologists, with Kim eventually moving to Hilton Head, SC, and April traveling the world with Club Med before settling back home. In 1987, Karin and April responded to an ad for

foster parents, becoming certified and welcoming their first foster baby, AJ. Karin's boundless energy and readiness to say "yes" defined her decades-long journey as a foster parent, even taking middle-of-the-night emergency calls.

Despite the demanding routine of caring for infants, Karin's life remained full of joy. She traveled extensively with April and the babies, enjoying sunny getaways in the Caribbean and Mexico. At home, she loved hosting gatherings, dressing up, and creating over-the-top holiday decorations. In 1992, Karin fostered a two-day-old boy named Bret. After two years of care, she encouraged April to adopt him, making her 17th foster baby her grandson.

In 2002, Karin, April, and Bret moved from Long Island to Hilton Head Island, SC, where Karin became a beloved figure. Known as "the lady with the babies," she strolled the island with her foster children in a 1959 English pram, charming residents who stopped to admire her dedication. Seven of her foster children stayed in contact over the years, a testament to her lasting impact.

Few have as ambitous a life goal as Karin did: fostering 100 babies or



100 years old, whichever came first. Karin surpassed her goal, fostering 103 little ones by her 93rd birthday. Even then, she wasn't ready to stop, telling her granddaughter, "I want just one more." She believed the secret to a long life lay in caring for others, finding purpose in the

daily routines shared with her foster babies—quiet mornings, shared meals, and tender moments. Up until the day she took ill, she was caring for both a 2 month old and a 2 year old. A nonagenarian and two babies sharing a day together, each putting the life in each other's lives.

In her final days, Karin was cared for by her family in a home filled

with reminders of her life's work—baby clothes, toys, bassinets, and strollers, all symbols of her immense love. She passed peacefully, surrounded by the comfort of a life well-lived, leaving behind a legacy of selflessness, love, and care.



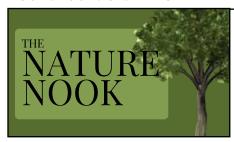

Winter Tree Care: Landscape Prep Now for a Healthy Spring

Pro tips from the tree experts at TreeWisemen

As winter approaches, many homeowners wonder when the best time is to trim their

trees and prepare their plants for the cold months ahead. Proper tree care is essential not only for the health of your trees but also for preserving the beauty and vitality of Hilton Head Plantation's lush, natural environment. While timing varies by tree species, fall and early winter are key to ensuring your landscape stays healthy through the winter and thrives in the spring.

Best Time to Trim Trees in South Carolina: Dormant Season

For most trees in South Carolina, the optimal time to trim is during the dormant season, which generally runs from late fall through early spring. During this time, trees are not actively growing, which reduces the risk of stress and damage. Pruning during dormancy allows for healthier, more effective tree care, with minimal risk of spreading diseases.

Pruning in winter offers several benefits:

- 1. Better Visibility: Without leaves, it's easier to assess the tree's structure and identify branches that need removal.
- 2. Less Stress: With no active growth, pruning is less taxing on the tree, making it easier to trim without harming it.
- 3. Promotes Healthy Growth: Proper winter pruning prepares the tree for a strong growth spurt in the spring.

Avoid trimming during periods of rapid growth, as this can disrupt the tree's natural development.

Pruning Tips Based on Tree Type

Different trees have different pruning needs:

- Deciduous Trees: Trees like oak, river birch, maple and willow benefit from winter pruning. Avoid pruning too early in fall, as this can leave trees vulnerable to pests.
- Evergreens: Pines, eastern red cedar, arborvitae and magnolia, can be trimmed year-round, but avoid excessive pruning from the canopy, as this can make them susceptible to disease.
- Hedges: Viburnum, ligustrum and podocarpus benefit from light pruning to maintain shape and health.
- Young Trees: Wait until young trees have completed at least two growing seasons before pruning. Never trim more than 25% of the foliage as this can stress the young tree and hinder its growth.

Fall and Early Winter Care: More Than Just Pruning

In addition to pruning, take these steps to prepare your trees for winter:

- Mulch: A thick layer insulates roots and conserves moisture.
- Watering: Deep watering ensures hydration throughout winter.
- Fertilizing: Use a slow-release formula to provide essential nutrients.
- Pest Protection: Wrap tree trunks with protective guards and clear away fallen leaves to prevent pests from nesting.

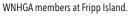

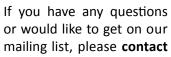

Winter Garden Tip

In December and January, it is a great idea to have a plan for protecting your tender plants from a freeze. You can purchase frost blankets, but old bedsheets, blankets, towels, or any cloth when a threat of freeze is predicted will work well. Make sure you bring the cover all the way to the ground, and if you can, elevate it above so that it does not rest on your plants. Avoid plastic unless you are putting it over your cloth to protect against moisture. Plastic transfers too much cold or heat and can damage plants quickly if it is touching them. When the temperature warms up, remove the coverings as soon as possible to allow your plants sunshine and air circulation.

- Despite being one of the only area communities without dedicated courts, H2P2 members try to find

Today's Lesson:

In addition, in the same amount of space that tennis accompanies 4 participants, Pickleball holds 16 players.
- With both sports experiencing growth, Lew Sherr, CEO of the USTA, points out, "Participation is not zero-sum, but the court space is." Simply swapping one sport for the other isn't a solution.
- It's clear that both sports are here to stay, and communities across the country are being challenged to find ways to accommodate the growing demand of both.

The Security Department plays * an integral role in keeping our community financially healthy.

Security officers interacted with 34,197 commercial vehicles at the gates, collecting over \$550,000 in fees, which benefits residents by keeping the HHPPOA annual assessments low.

Statistically, preventive * patrolling has been proven to significantly reduce crime.

Hilton Head Plantation has 72 miles of roadway. This year-to-date, security officers have completed 139,581 patrol miles, working 24/7 keeping residents safe.

Having a Security Department * that is available 24 hours a day can literally be life-saving.

Resident calls for assistance the past 11 months resulted in 1,391 visits by security officers. Of these, 544 were medical calls, providing help to those in need.

A low crime rate doesn't happen by accident. It takes a diligent and dedicated Security Department.

Security checks of residences and businesses are conducted daily. In the past, some businesses have had unauthorized people sleeping in buildings and had property and cash thefts. YTD, security has conducted 35,613 security checks. This helps keep crime within the plantation near zero.

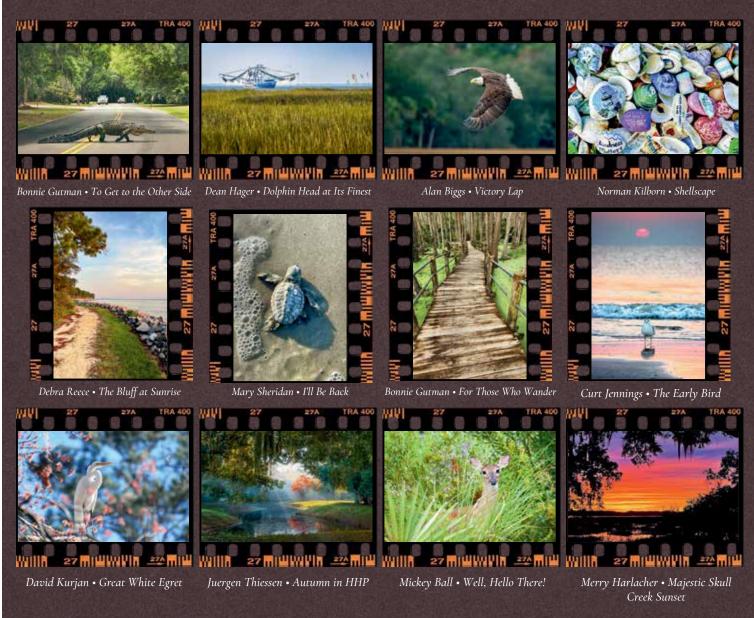
